Jamestown was the first permanent English settlement in North America (May 14, 1607)

indentured servants:

people who received a free trip to NA by North America agreeing to work w/out pay for years

Bacon's Rebellion:

armed rebellion in 1676 by Virginia settlers led by Nathaniel Bacon against the rule of Gov Berkely (attacked & burned Jamestown)

Why did they make the

Toleration Act of 1649?

This bill made it a crime to restrict religious rights for christians.

What did John Smith do?

He helped Govern the British colony Jamestown. After he was "saved" by Pocahontas, he established trading agreements w/ Native tribes

People from many nations settled in the middle colonies.



The most famous incident was the Boston Tea Party in December 1773. Colonists boarded the ships disguised as Indians. Dumped 95 tons of tea in the Boston Harbor.

**1773** The Boston Tea Party  
The Tea Act is passed, making British tea cheaper than colonial tea.

**Stamp Act (1765)**  
Purpose: to raise revenue (money) to pay for British soldiers in the colonies.

**1765** The Stamp Act  
The Stamp Act taxes newspapers, licenses and colonial paper products

**1763**

**1764** The Sugar Act  
The Sugar Act is passed to raise money from colonies for Britain.

**1770**

**1770** The Boston Massacre  
British soldiers fire into a crowd of colonists, killing five men.

**Boston Massacre (March 1770)**  
An angry mob confronted a small group of soldiers, & out of fear for their safety, the soldiers fired their weapons. 5 people were killed, including former slave named Crispus Attucks.

It lowered the duties (tax) of the Molasses act of 1733.

**1774** The Intolerable Act  
Boston Harbor is closed, and British troops are quartered.

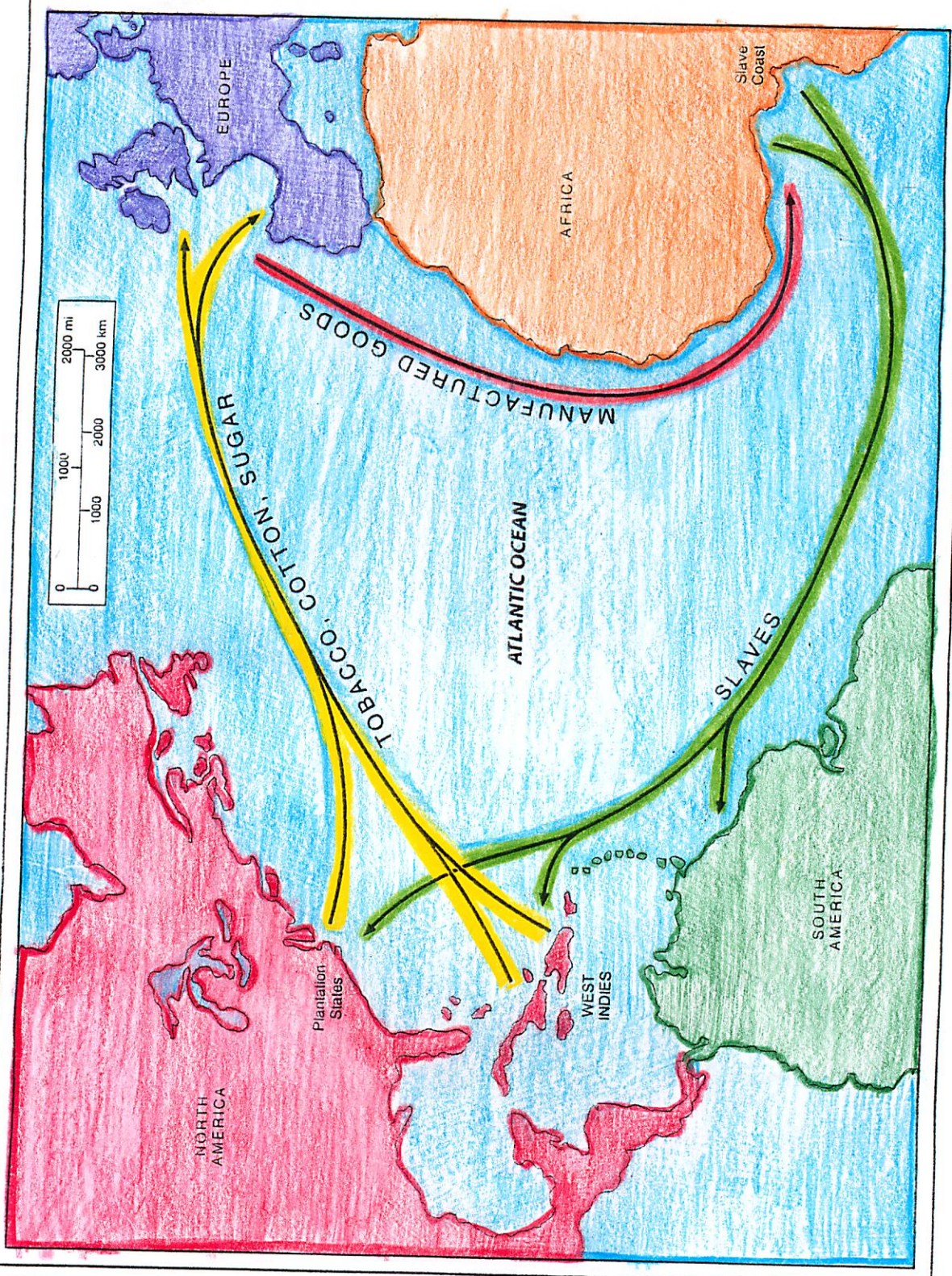
Ebola Can Spread by direct contact! (blood or body fluid)



Triangular Trade Route late 1700's

Ocean currents made possible a triangle of sea travel that allowed traders to profit from the Atlantic slave routes. Goods could be loaded in Europe, sold in Africa, slaves bought and then shipped to the West Indies, where more goods were embarked for sale in Europe.
