


The Death of Martin Luther King Jr.



Within hours, rioting erupted in more than 120 cities. Within three weeks, 46 people were dead, some 2,600 were injured, and more than 21,000 were arrested.

Civil Rights Act of 1968 (aka Fair Housing Act)

- Congress passes the law days after the assassination of MLK, who had taken on the issue of racial discrimination in housing.
- bans discrimination in housing sales and rentals.
- The law gives the federal government authority to file lawsuits against those who violate the law.
- From 1950 to 1980, the total black population in urban centers increased from 6.1 million to 15.3 million.



- In 1968, Shirley Chisholm of New York became the first woman to win election to the House of Representatives (NY).
- In 1969, the black members of the House of Representatives form Congressional Black Caucus
- Over the years, the caucus has worked to address legislative concerns of African Americans.





- By 1970 the Black Panther Party had split so many times due to internal problems that it became ineffective.
- Carmichael left the party because he wanted all whites banned from it.
- Seale and Newton
 resigned in the same year.
 The party continued for a
 short time under new
 leadership providing
 service projects in the
 ghettos.

Civil Rights Changes in the 1970s

- Busing and political change—to speed the integration of city schools, courts began ordering that some students be bused from their neighborhood schools to schools in other areas
- Affirmative action—
 programs that gave
 preference to minorities
 and women in hiring and
 admissions to make up for
 past discrimination against
 these groups
